
COVER PICTURE

This is one of the very early photos in the Frederick Cole collection from about 1930 and I have no doubt that people were worried then about the price of fuel for heating and cooking, as we are now. Here we see coal being weighed up in the cauldron before taking it into a house, or perhaps dropping it into the cellar via a manhole behind the man that is standing.

Another Frederick Cole photo of c.1936 showing *Old Ben*, who was spruced up for his photo in *The Avenue, Potters Bar*. On the front of the cart it faintly reads, '*Billing & Howard, Potters Bar Station.*' They were coal merchants and also sold building supplies. Ben may have been purchased as an ex-war horse after WW1, but was used here to pull a coal-delivery cart. On his summer days off, he would graze the field where the Cranborne Industrial Estate is now and was befriended by the local children. In winter he had stables in Cranborne Road.

Cromer, the last of Hertfordshire's Windmills, by Mr. Robin Webb.

Cromer Windmill is the sole remaining windmill in Hertfordshire, and was painstakingly restored over a period of thirty years by the Hertfordshire Building Preservation Trust. The initial phase of work in 1968/9 included the provision of a new ladder and fantail (the small windmill above the ladder, which used to turn the Mill itself to face the wind).

HELPING ST. MARY'S CHURCH

Our member, Peter Bevan, who is the vicar of St. Mary's Church in The Walk, requested through his committee for help from our Historical Society to make a display of the history of St. Mary's, to be put up in the church on the day of their Craft Fair on Saturday October 19th.

Chris Ruge-Cope and I found some photos from our collection and also ones from the church's files and a display was made.

The church has a beautiful cross kept in the All Souls Chapel made from parts of the melted-down frame of the L31 Zeppelin that was shot down in Oakmere Park on October 1st 1916, so we took other parts of the Zeppelin and other information from our museum to add to the display.

We were also able to sell some of our books which told the history of the Zeppelin and the church, Richard Lee made some postcards of the church and the cross which he printed in colour and black and white, these will now be on sale in the museum.


We thank Dan, Chris's husband, for helping us set up the tables.

KING CHARLES THE MARTYR and BOROUGH WAY

In the Winter 2013 issue of the Potter Bar Community News, Canon Michael Burns wrote about the church hall of King Charles the Martyr, the hall having been completed ten years ago. In the article he refers to the association between the Church when it was being built in the late 1930's and a house in Borough Way built about 1936. My wife and I can vouch for the link to which he refers as by chance, we bought the Tudor-style semi when we moved to Potters Bar in 1956 ~ but it was only after we settled-in that we learned from fellow church members that a previous resident had been the minister of King Charles the Martyr and that the living room of our new home had been used for church services, with Sunday School being held in our somewhat flimsy garage constructed of asbestos sheets. We considered ourselves to be privileged to be the owners of a property with such a local history, even though the garage was in need of attention. In fact, in the summer of 1964 I demolished the KCTM "Sunday School" garage and built a new one with brick walls; the photo shows our three-year-old daughter Siân amusing herself as an excellent brick-layer's mate by sorting out the bricks for me. We would not get away with such child-labour these days!

We bought the house in 1956 for what we thought at the time was the enormous sum of £ 2,400. We stretched ourselves financially and took out a mortgage for 25 years, but we lived there for only nine, when we decided to move to Little Heath to be nearer to our children's school. Our house in Borough Way was put on the market in November 1965 and (such was the property market at the time) was sold within a week to an up-and-coming pop singer Spencer Davis who, in the run-up to Christmas 1965, toppled the Beatles from No.1 in the charts with his hit song *Keep on Running* - which, after almost fifty years, we still hear from time to time. As Christmas 1965 approached we were anxious to get all the documents signed and cleared before the offices of our solicitor closed for the festive season, as we had planned to move on Thursday 6th January 1966. However, Spencer Davis was nowhere to be found for his signature, as he had gone into hiding without trace, hounded by the BBC and music press journalists. But eventually all documentation was cleared early January for our planned move.

Unfortunately, on the planned day, our move from Borough Way to Little Heath was somewhat hampered by a very heavy fall of snow in the early hour of January 6th. We transported our pet cat (securely, we thought) in his travel basket, but shortly after our arrival at our new home in he managed to escape, and dashed out through the open front door into the fresh snow. You would have thought that it was a relatively easy matter to spot a completely black cat in brilliant-white crisp snow by following his paw marks ~ but not so. He had vanished rapidly out of sight, glad to be out of his basket. But much to the delight of the whole family, he re-appeared several days later ~ perhaps pleased to find the comfort of a warm home. How is it possible for an animal to find its way back, after several days, to a new home which it had “visited” for only an hour or so? Just chance, or animal magic?

As a footnote, we often wondered whether our semi-detached in Borough Way had ever been consecrated for church services - and if so, has it ever been de-consecrated?

LONDON'S LOST BATTLEFIELDS


This new book by Robert Bard covers some of the battles in London between Boudicca to World War I.

Pages 87 to 100 on the Battle of Barnet refer to the Society's publications.


There are also sections on the Cuffley and Potters Bar Zeppelins, and the First and Second Battle of St. Albans.
